Somerville is a rapidly gentrifying town next to Cambridge. According to its town website: "a myriad of immigrants from all over the world make Somerville the most densely populated community in New England and one of the most ethnically diverse cities in the nation" (City of Somerville Website). It borders Cambridge, Medford, Everett, Arlington, and Charlestown.

The Redline already stops in Somerville but the MBTA is currently working on an extension of the Green line into Somerville which will add several T stops. The Assembly Square Mall offers outlet shopping and many other amenities.

LOCAL AMENITIES

There is an affordable Market Basket in Somerville, a Trader Joes, a couple of Stop and Shop locations, a Star Market and non-chain stores such as Amigos Grocery Store and Bombay Market. Somerville has several weekly farmers markets including one that moves indoors during the winter. There are many free or low-cost activities for families and children. BOKS (Building Our Kids Success) is a free before-school fitness program for K- 5 students. (Somerville Hub). Dilboy Pool is an open air pool for summer swimming and the Kennedy Pool is an indoor pool with year-round swimming and instruction. The Veteran's Memorial Rink provides a full size rink and a smaller one with skate rental for all ages (Somerville Hub). The nonprofit Science Club for Girls offers free clubs and other activities designed to promote interest in STEM for girls and young women.

Somerville recreation offers a huge variety of sports and other activities for the whole family. There are also numerous commercial activities for families including: Brooklyn Boulders provides indoor climbing, Esh Circus Arts has classes on a variety of circus performance skills, Sacco Bowl Haven has candlepin bowling and flatbread pizza. Somerville also offers many events throughout the year including Porchfest where musicians play music from their front porches and yards. Somerville High partners with a local nonprofit to offer special mentoring and other programs to immigrant youth.
